Forget High School Musical – here's the real deal! Were the World Mine is an original and invigorating mix of the musical and teen flick, blended in with the pangs of first-love and a healthy dash of fairy dust, all set against the magical backdrop of A Midsummer Night's Dream.

Openly gay Timothy lives with his single mother, and attends an all-boys school where he's prone to musical daydreams to escape the drudgery of class. and the homophobic taunts from his fellow students. The object of his desire is Jonathon, the handsome star of the rugby team, and Timothy dreams this very straight boy will fall in love with him. When Timothy is selected to play the mischievous Puck in the school production of Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream, and Jonathon is also cast in the play, it seems fate is on his side. Soon Timothy discovers a recipe hidden in the text to create a magical love-pansy - if you're sprayed with the nectar from the flower you will fall madly in love with the next person you see. Will Timothy tempt fate and use the flower on Jonathon?

Armed with innovative songs and spirited choreography, and a wonderful spirit of adventure, director Tom Gustafson has crafted an exuberant crowd-pleaser based on his 2003 short film



Fairies. Were the World Mine is full of wonderful performances, including Wendy Robie (the eye-patch wearing Nadine from Twin Peaks) as the drama teacher, and Broadway star Judy McLane as Timothy's mum. But shining above all is newcomer Tanner Cohen as Timothy who radiates star quality in his first lead role. A huge success wherever it screens, Were the World Mine is the perfect way to kick off this year's Festivall (Paul Tonta – 19th Melbourne Queer Film Festival)





## The Uncertainty Principle

Two women meet in a doctor's waiting room. In that instant, despite the universe between them, their lives become paradoxically entangled. Knowing how to die can mean knowing how to live, and uncertainty can be a rewarding experience.

Take one steak, a little rock salt and freshly cracked pepper. Season well. Add a dash of bitterness, and garnish with resentment. Serve.

Inspiring documentary that follows the sometimes painful but ultimately positive story of Kris who is in the midst of a transition from female to male.





Yen Tan, USA, 2008, video, 87 min

Jeff and Mark had been best friends since college, and when Mark dies suddenly it falls upon Jeff to sort out his personal details. Checking Mark's emails, Jeff comes across one from an Italian man, Andrea, who had been corresponding with Mark, informing him that he would be in the US and wants to meet for the first time. Jeff relays the tragic news about Mark's passing, but Andrea still decides to visit. With seemingly nothing in common but Mark, the two talk in polite conversation, which soon turns more

intimate and personal. Over the course of a weekend these two men share honest, revealing, and ultimately cathartic exchanges, with the spectre of Mark always hovering.

A marked change of pace from most US gay-themed films, Clao is an intimate drama that seduces you with beautifully observed moments, realistic performances and subtle direction. Director Yen Tan has crafted an achingly affecting film about love, loss and the desire for connection. (Paul Tonta - 19th Melbourne Queer Film Festival)




Those lucky enough to catch The World Unseen at last year's Melbourne Queer Film Festival will be delighted to find out that it isn't the only film writer/director Sarif has made in recent years. And they'll be even happier to discover that both films feature the same two leading actresses. Here's a filmmaker who definitely knows when she's on to a good thing. In I Can't Think Straight, Lisa Ray and Sheetal Sheth again prove they have chemistry to burn in a contemporary romance about Tala (Ray), a wealthy Jordanian living in London, who is just about to finally tie the knot (with her fourth fiancé), when she meets Leyla (Sheth), an Indian English woman, currently dating Tala's old buddy, Ali. Sparks fly, but will convention and culture get in the way before the course of true love can do its thing?

Full of genuinely tender moments and some deft comic touches, I Can't Think Straight is a must for lovers of uplifting romantic cinema. Ray and Sheth both bring real depth and sensitivity to their roles. Oh, and if it's just the eye candy factor you're interested in, did we mention how gorgeous they are? 
