
Cloudburst

Dir: Thom Fitzgerald, Canada, 2011, video, 93 min

Olympia Dukakis already has a place in the hearts of queers with her brilliant portrayal of Anna Madrigal in the Tales of the City series, not to mention her performances in Steel Magnolias, The Event, and her Oscar-winning role in Moonstruck. Almost singlehandedly comering the acting market for strong-willed women, and with a mouth to match, in Cloudburst, you ain't seen – or heard – nothing yet!

Dukakis plays Stella who's lived with her partner, Dot (Oscar-winner Brenda Fricker), for over 30 years in Maine, USA, but Dot's grand-daughter thinks the best place for her grandma is in a nursing home. Tricked into signing over the house and forced to move into a home, Dot is busted out by Stella, and the two women decide to high-tail it to Canada, where same-sex marriage is legal. Getting hitched is their last-gasp bid to stay together. Along the way they pick up sexy hitchhiker, Prentice, a small-town boy turned modern dancer, who's returning to his Canadian town to visit his dying mother. Will this unorthodox 'family' make it across the border in one piece and realise their dreams?

Winner of numerous awards, Cloudburst is the latest movie from Canadian filmmaker Thom Fitzgerald. who has been making award-winning queer cinema for over 15 years, including Three Needles (MQFF 2006), Beefcake (MQFF 2000), The Event (MQFF 2004) and The Hanging Garden. Funny, emotionally engaging and beautifully made, hop aboard this romantic road movie – you'll be glad you did!

SESSION 4 SATURDAY 21 APRIL 3.30pm

THE CURE: A DOCUMENTARY FILM

Dir: Heather Corkhill, Australia, 2011, video, 60 min

This new Australian documentary investigates reparative programs (ex-gay ministries) and the mental health implications of trying to 'change' one's sexuality. Emerging from the vestiges of the 1970s ex-gay movement, many organisations (both here and overseas) continue to promote 'freedom' or 'transformation' from homosexuality. Through a series of candid interviews, The Cure breaks through the semantics of a range of reparative methodologies to unveil a single ultimatum to homosexual Christians – you must change. The lexicon of such programs has evolved to suggest a more temperate approach than aversion therapies, such as electro-shock therapy, once used in the past to re-orientate sexuality. But even in their current incarnation within organisations such as Exodus and Living Waters, these programs continue to have devastating effects on the mental and emotional health of many participants.

Such stressful emotional turmoil is compounded within the Christian context, where a failure to change or even suppress one's homosexuality bears the consequence of ostracism from the church community and support network, and the threat of eternal spiritual damnation. Ultimately though, The Cure discovers the resilience of the human spirit in the pursuit of true happiness. In accepting themselves for who they really are and embracing their identity, participants finally experience the happiness of living an authentic life, and a tangible sense of freedom.



SESSION 5 SATURDAY 21 APRIL 5.00pm

MORGAN

Dir: Michael D Akers, USA, 2011, video, 90 min

Morgan is a fit competitive cyclist who suffers a catastrophic accident during a race that leaves him paralysed from the waist down and forever confined to a wheelchair. After a long stint in hospital he's now able to live at home, but depends heavily upon his mother after he lost his job and his boyfriend left him during recovery.

His loss of independence makes him justifiably angry as he struggles with the difficulty of performing simple daily tasks in an effort to regain some independence.

For awhile he lets negative feelings get the better of him and turns to alcohol for comfort, but before long finds the strength to get out into the world again, where he meets and begins dating Dean, who is trying to resurrect his own life after nursing his sick mother. As they negotiate the vagaries of their new relationship, they must also face their own substantial fears.

After Morgan buys a new wheelchair and begins training for a race, he is forced to face some difficult personal truths.





SESSION 6 SATURDAY 21 APRIL 8.00pm

D.E.B.S.

Dir: Angela Robinson, USA, 2004, video, 83 min

Opening night MQFF 2005. Back by popular demand. Audiences all over the world loved this spy-spoof-meets-teen-flick D.E.B.S. back in 2004. While comparisons with Charlie's Angels and Austin Powers are inevitable, a more precise reference would be the smart 1980s teen comedies from John Hughes, which seemed to define a generation.

Embedded in the Standard Aptitude Test for American high school students is a hidden test which cherry picks pupils who can lie, fight, and steal for an elite secret defense program called the D.E.B.S. Amy is the 'perfect score' and the Academy's great hope for finally defeating gorgeous and sexy arch villain Lucy Diamond ('so evil, no agent has survived a meeting with her' ñ and a dead ringer for Demi Moore!). Right off the bat itis clear that Lucy intrigues Amy more than she cares to admit, and when they finally meet, the chemistry is more than they can handle. Will Amy give up her alpha, beta, gamma existence, and trade it all in for romance with the alluring Diamond? In D.E.B.S., Robinson has created a genuinely funny all-girl-action romp, with an easy-on-the-eye cast and a cracking retro soundtrack. For all the girls who longed for Charlieis Angels with a bit of girl on girl action - your dreams have been answered!
